# The passive

To form the **passive form** of the **simple past** you need **was** or **were + past participle**.

I		You	
Не	was	We	were
She		They	
Īt			

The **past participle** of regular verbs is formed by adding **-d** or **-ed** to the infinitive. For a list of irregular verbs see page 185.

The **passive** form of the verb is used when it's not important to say who did something or when you don't know who did it.

*Examples:* The wedding tables **were decorated** with beautiful autumn decorations. The order was dispatched two days ago.
