The first celebration of the new year is New Year's Day on the $\qquad$ (1.) of January. In fact, this is also the last celebration of the old year, on New Year's Eve, the $\qquad$ (2.) of December. Most people celebrate with friends and family, and spend the first week of January trying to recover from the celebration!

Things are quiet then, till the $\qquad$ (3.) of February - St. Valentine's Day. This is the most romantic day of the year, a festival that celebrates love and romance. Easter is the next festival; it usually takes place in March or April. Of course, we cannot forget April Fool's Day on the
$\qquad$ (4.) of April, the day of tricks and jokes. After that, there is a public holiday on the
$\qquad$ (5.) of May, called May Day, a public holiday not only for workers but one that has many old traditions and customs from ancient times. The next festivals come in autumn: Halloween is on the $\qquad$ (7.) of October. In Britain, Guy Fawkes' Night - or Bonfire Night - is celebrated on the $\qquad$ (8.) of November. When this is over, children start looking forward to Christmastime. Christmas Eve, on the $\qquad$ (9.) of

December, is not celebrated in a very big way; most people spend the day preparing for Christmas Day, on the $\qquad$ (10.) of December. This is when people open their presents and celebrate with a big dinner. The second-last special day is Boxing Day, on the $\qquad$ (11.) of December. The origin of this day is not clear: some people think it comes from the time when the rich people gave food to poorer people (in boxes), others think it comes from the tradition of opening the money collection boxes in churches, to give this money to the poor. In any case, as soon as this day is over, people start to prepare once again for the last celebration of the old year and the first of the new, and the whole cycle begins once again!
